Name: Black Vulture

Scientific Name:

Coragyps atratus

Size: Height - 60-68cm (23.5-26.5in)

Weight - 1.6-2.2kg (56-77oz)

Wingspan – 1.3-1.5m (54-59in)

Colour: Glossy black feathers all over, with white tips on the underside of their primary flight feathers. Their legs and beaks are pale and their featherless heads are dark grey.

Lifespan: 5-10 years

Habitat: Forages over open fields and coastal plains and roosts in nearby forests.

Range: Southeastern US and down through Mexico into South America. June 2015 Volume 7 Issue 3 Page 2 carrion (dead animals) but will kill small prey if necessary. Will also forage in human garbage. Families often forage together in flocks.

Breeding: Mating for life, the pair nests on the ground in a thicket, a cave or even abandoned building, returning to their nesting place each year. A clutch of 1-3 pale greenish eggs are incubated by the pair for up to 40 days. Young remain in the nest for 60 days then remain dependent on their parents for up to eight months before joining the family hunting party.

Fun Facts: They hunt using sight instead of smell the way the Turkey Vulture does. They will follow Turkey Vultures to food sources then drive them off by outnumbering them.

They avoid flying over open water so are rarely found on islands but they will wade into water to reach floating carcasses.
